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The statistical data book presents main indicators characterizing level and dynamics of prices in the consumer market Republic of Belarus.

Intended for senior managerial staff, government officials, financial and economic departments of organizations, research community, higher education teaching staff, post-graduates and students, and other interested users.

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FOREWORD

The data book presents statistical information reflecting price processes in the consumer market of the Republic of Belarus in 2008-2013. The book comprises statistical data on the level and dynamics of prices (tariffs) in the consumer market of the Republic of Belarus, selected financial indicators and international comparisons. The information is provided in the form of tables and graphic material.

Data on consumer price indices and average prices on goods (services) are given at the level of the Republic of Belarus and in the breakdown by regions and Minsk City.

In several cases the data for 2013 are provisional and are subject to revision in further issues.

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BRIEF METHODOLOGICAL NOTES ON PRICE AND TARIFF INDICES CALCULATION

Consumer Price Index (CPI) describes changes over time in general price (tariff) level for goods and services purchased by consumers for non-productive consumption. It is one of the key indicators characterizing the rate of inflation and is used to analyse and forecast price processes in the economy, resolve legal issues, and convert a number of variables of the system of national accounts at current prices into those at constant prices. The CPI is calculated on the basis of more than 400 particular goods and services selected to represent the structure of consumption expenditure in the country.

Prices/ tariffs of goods/ services are recorded in 31 towns selected to represent the socio-economic situation of the regions and the level of consumer market saturation with goods and services. Prices are collected from state and non-state trading outlets, urban markets, organisations providing paid services to the population, and individual entrepreneurs engaged in retail trade and services sector.

The pattern of actual consumption expenditure in the country is estimated on the basis of data on household spending on goods and services obtained from household sample survey.

The source data for index construction are data on prices (tariffs) recorded for specific goods and services, on the basis of which average comparable prices (tariffs) of both reference and previous periods are produced. A price (tariff) is considered comparable if it is recorded at the same trading / services-providing entity for the same or similar in quality good/ service.

On the basis of individual price (tariff) indices for towns included in the state statistical survey, and the area weights, aggregate price (tariffs) indices of individual goods (services) and commodity (service groups) are calculated for the region as a whole. As an area weight, the share of population resident in the surveyed area in the total population of the country is used.

Based on the aggregate price (tariff) indices of goods and services for the region as a whole and the share of expenditure on purchasing those in consumption expenditure of the population, the total price (tariff) indices for the groups of food, non-food goods and services, and also the consumer price index for the country as a whole are calculated.

Along with the prices (tariffs) recorded and indices (tariffs) computed for specific representative goods (services), average prices (tariffs) of commodity and/or services groups and changes in average prices (tariffs) are also calculated.

Core consumer price index is a consumer price index reflecting the long-term dynamics of price movements not influenced by administrative and seasonal factors.

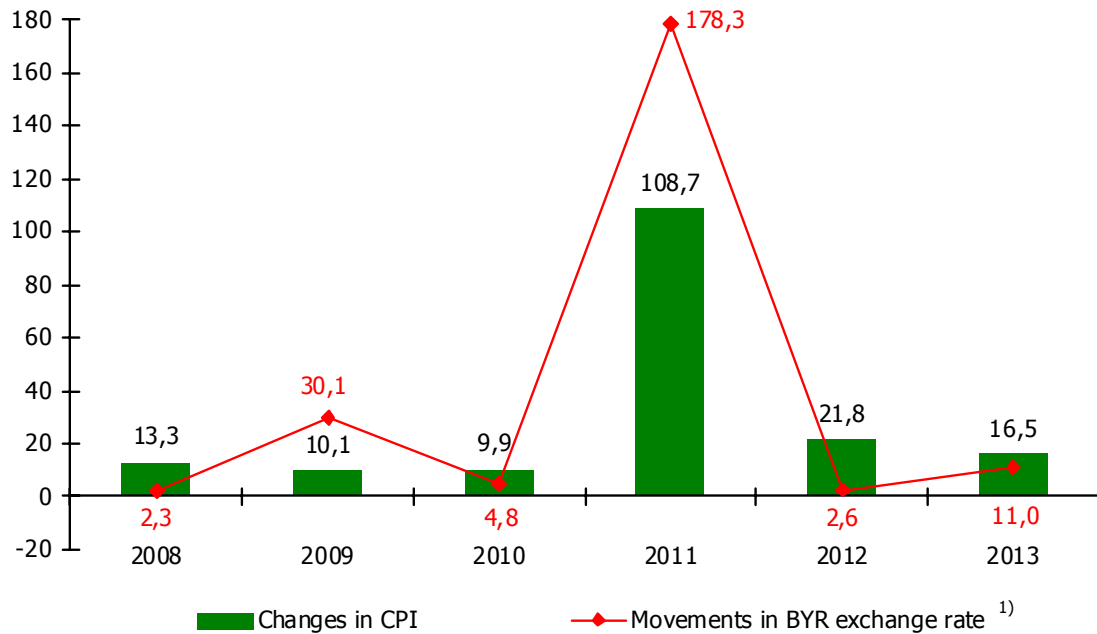

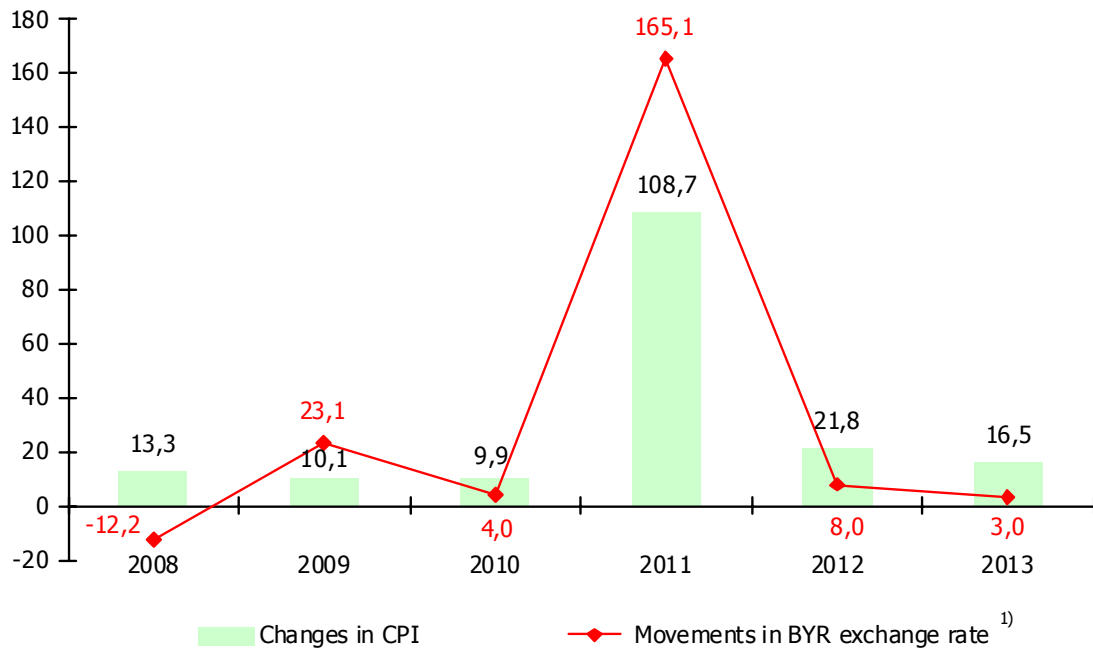
1.4. Inflation and movements in exchange rate of Belarusian ruble to U.S. dollar

(December to December of previous year; percent)



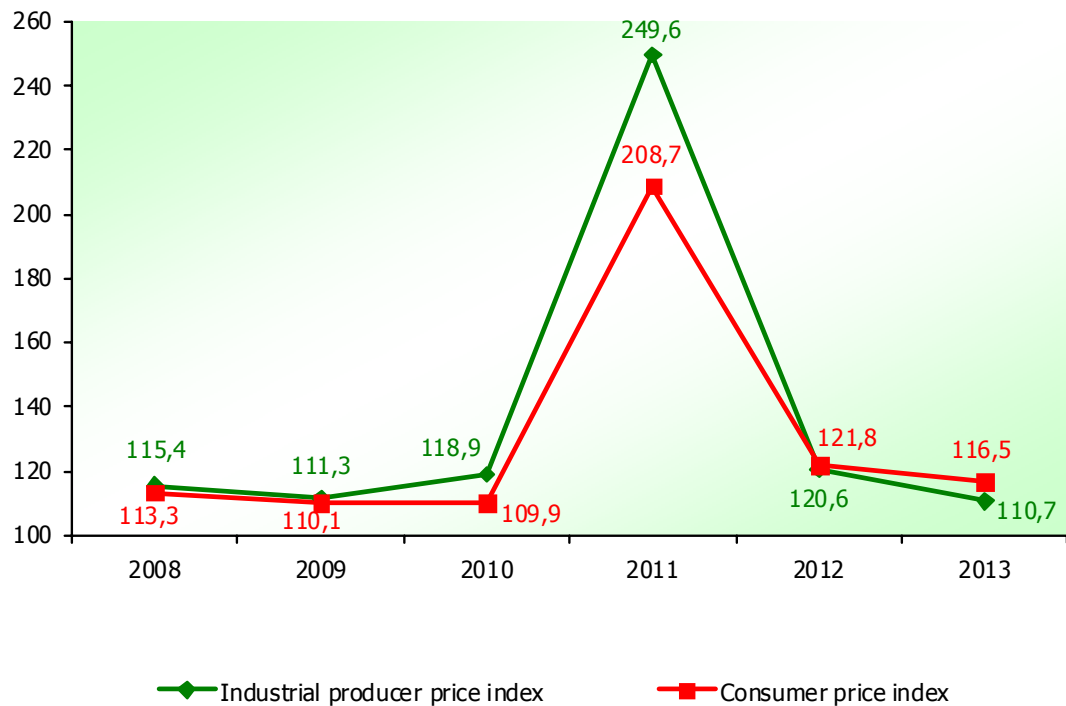

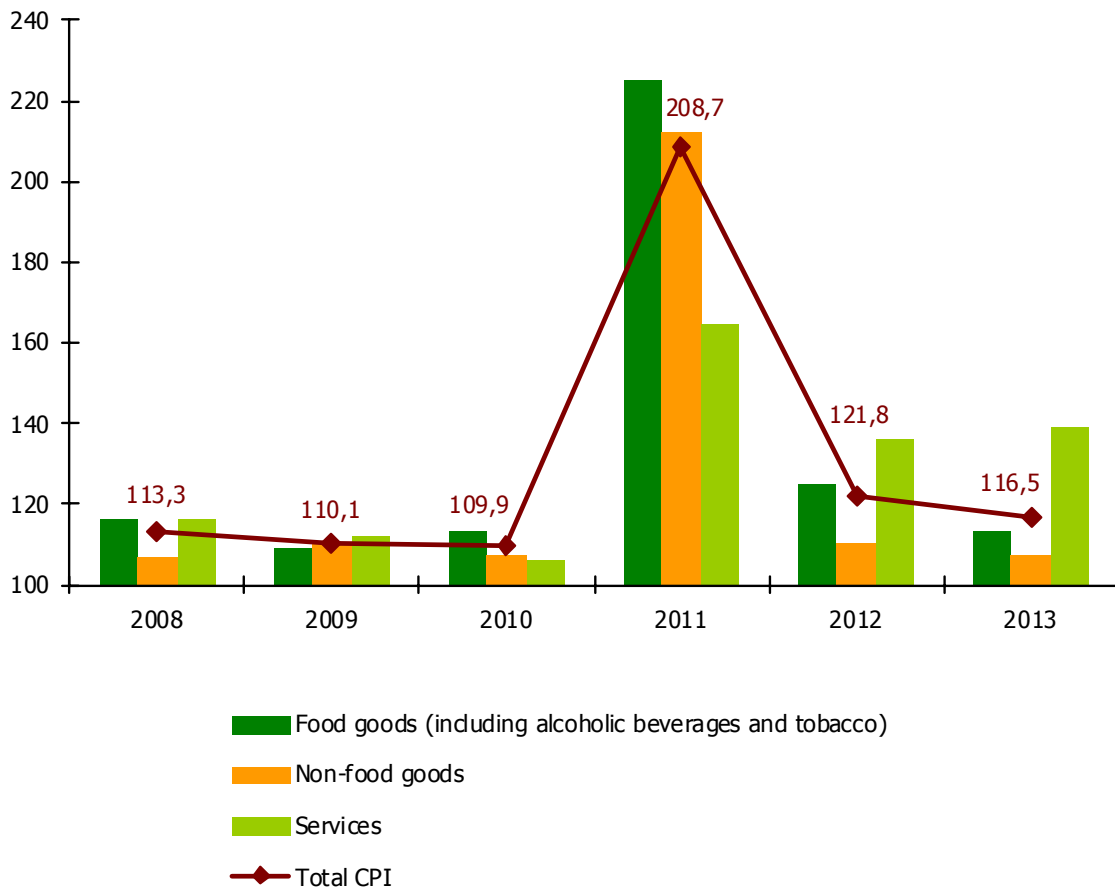

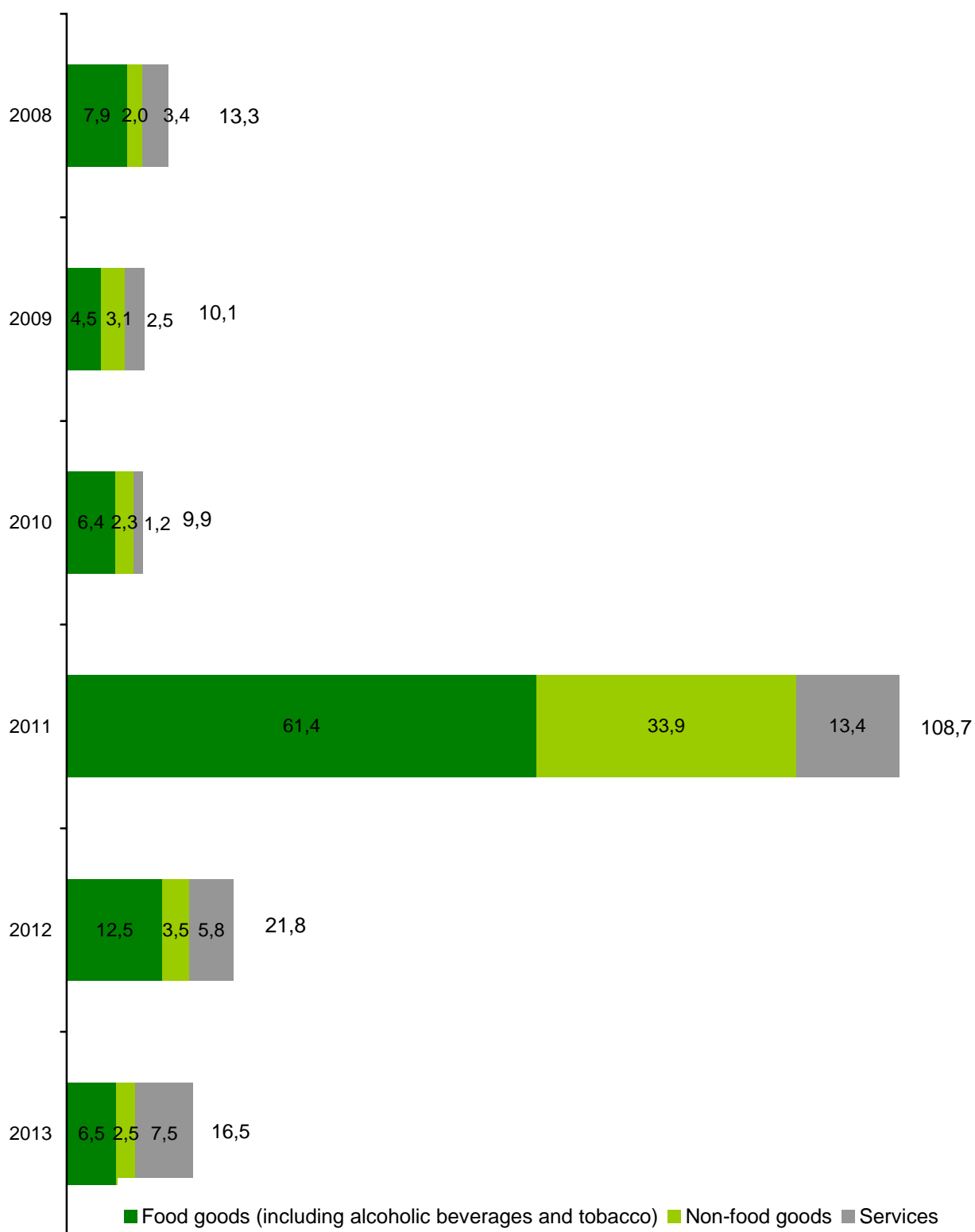
2.2. Price and tariff indices for consumer goods and services

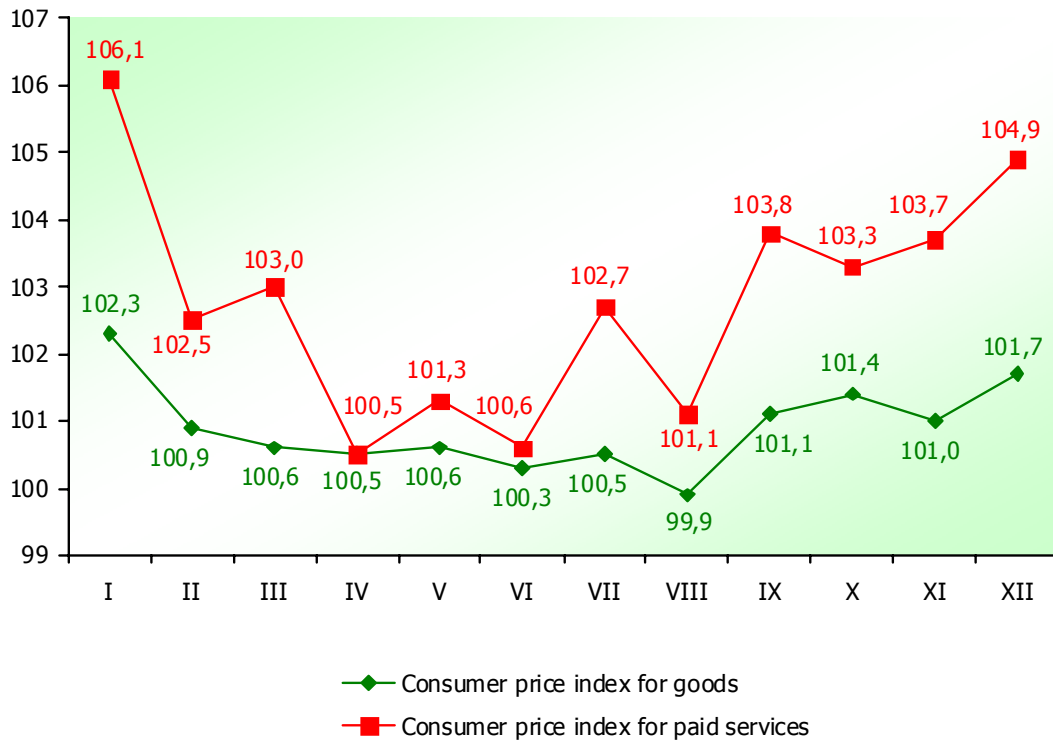

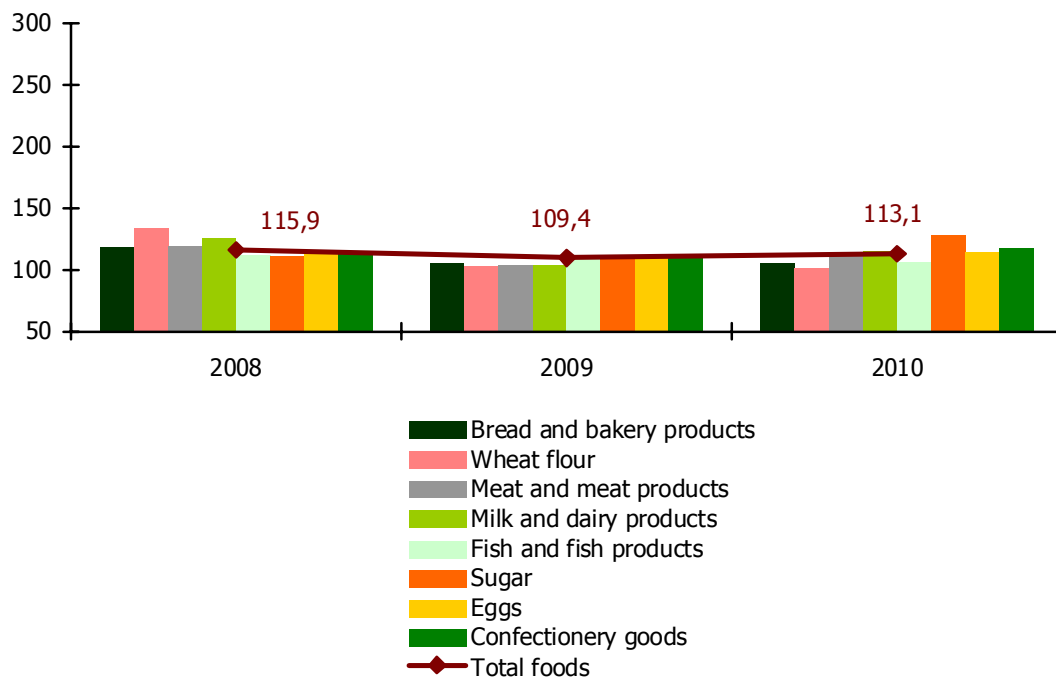

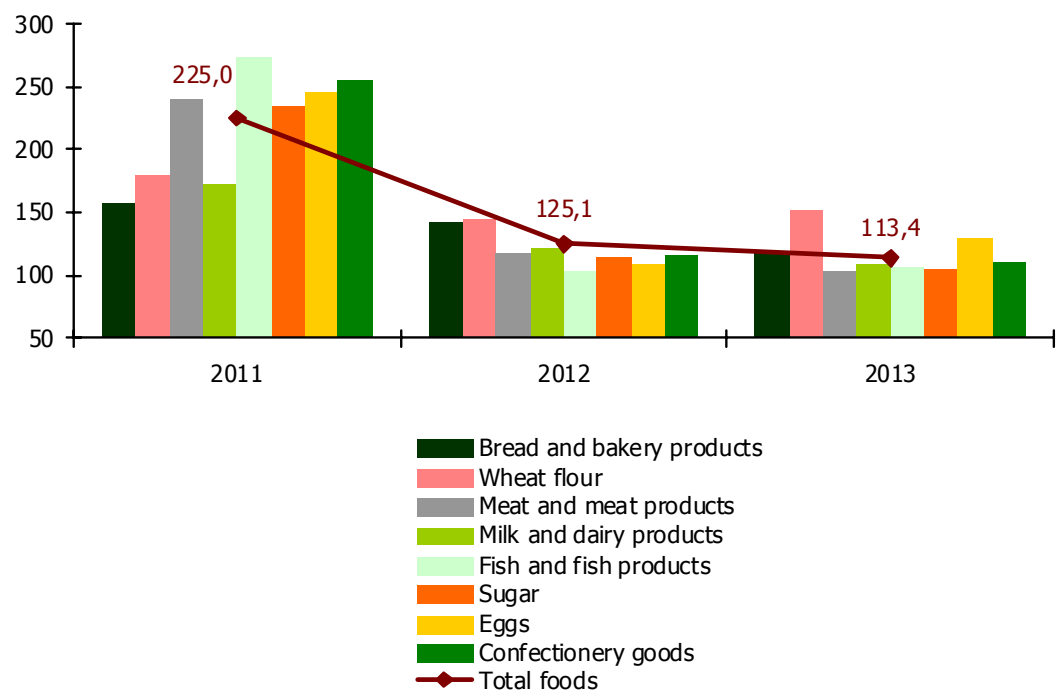
2.13. Consumer price indices for food goods in 2008-2010 (including alcoholic beverages and tobacco)

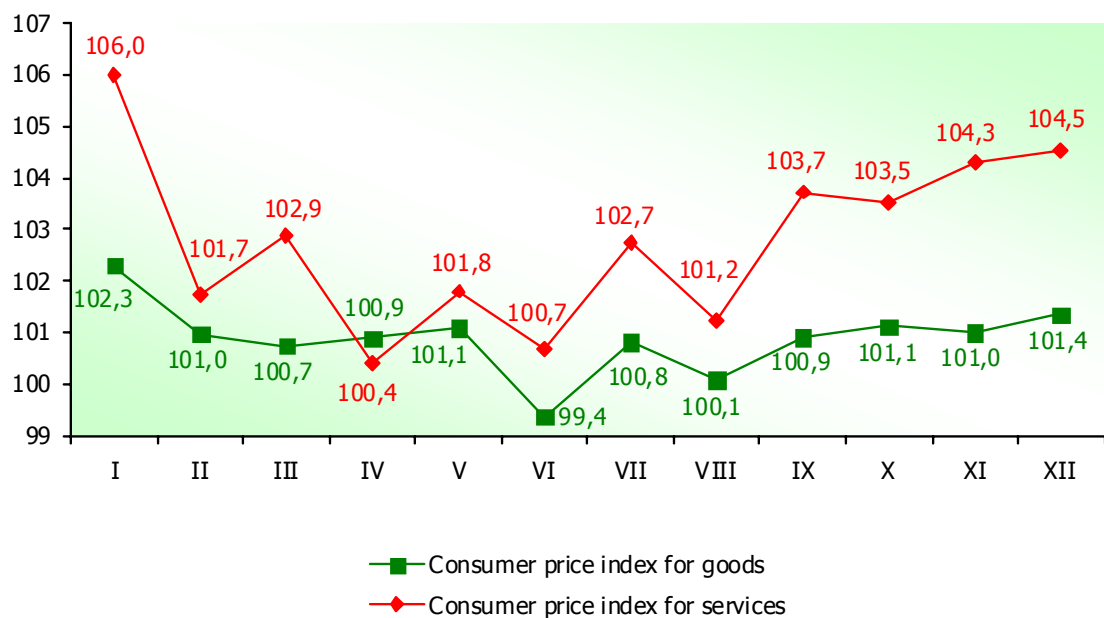

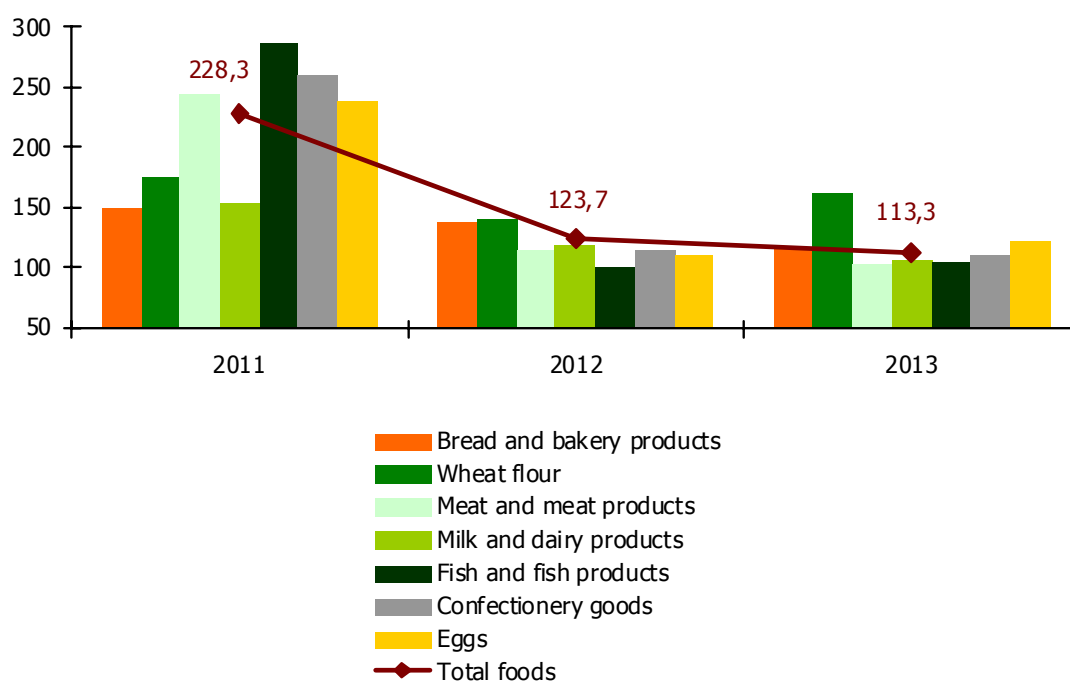

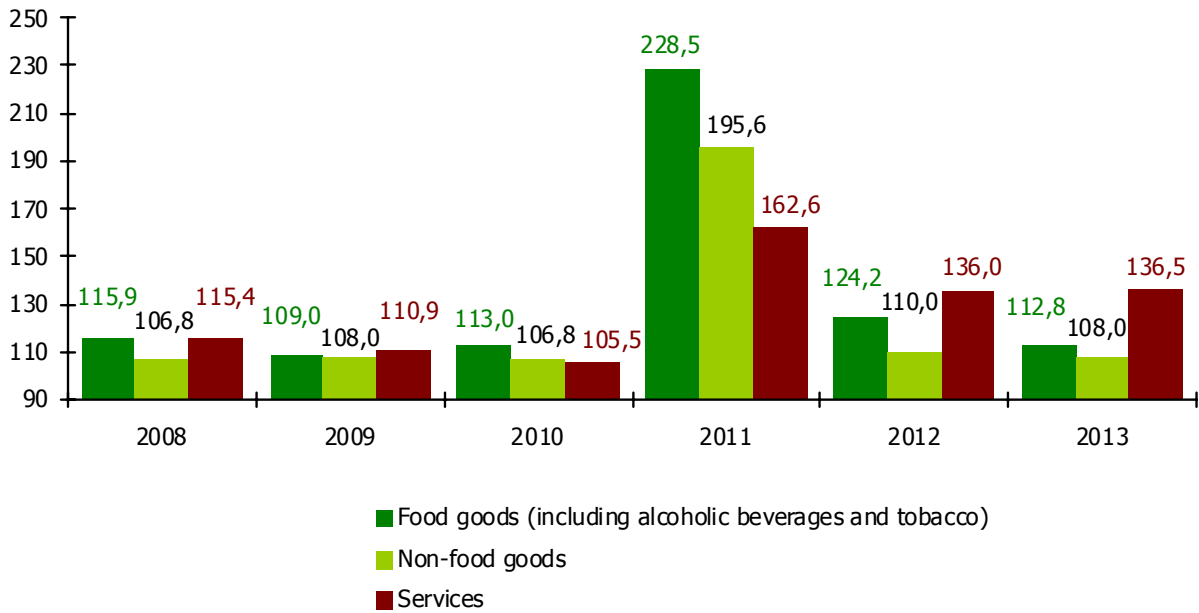
2.27. Consumer price indices for food goods for Brest region in 2011-2013 (including alcoholic beverages and tobacco)

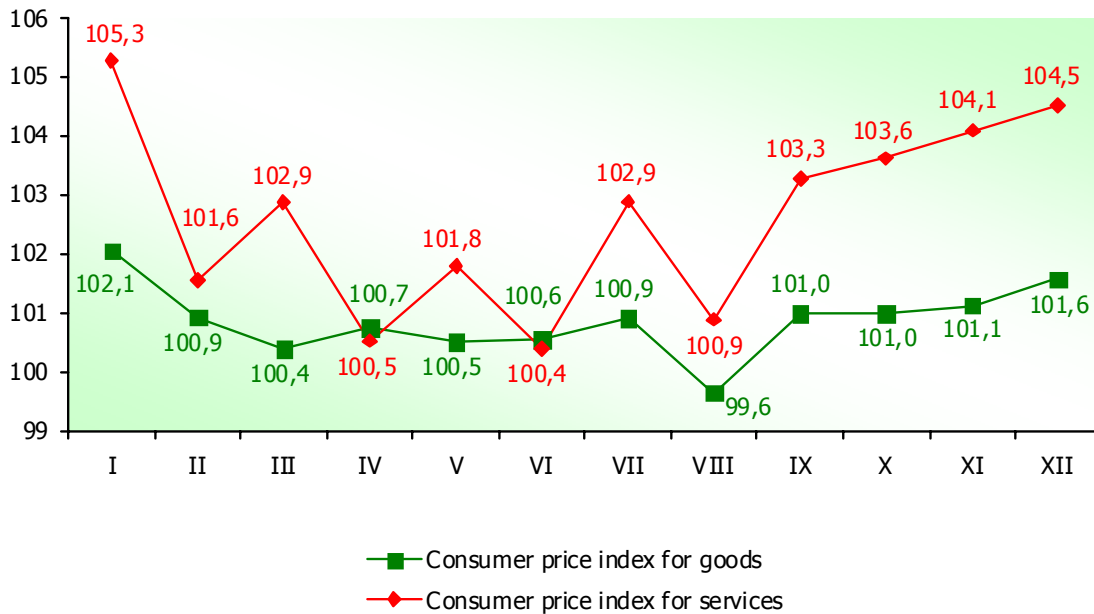

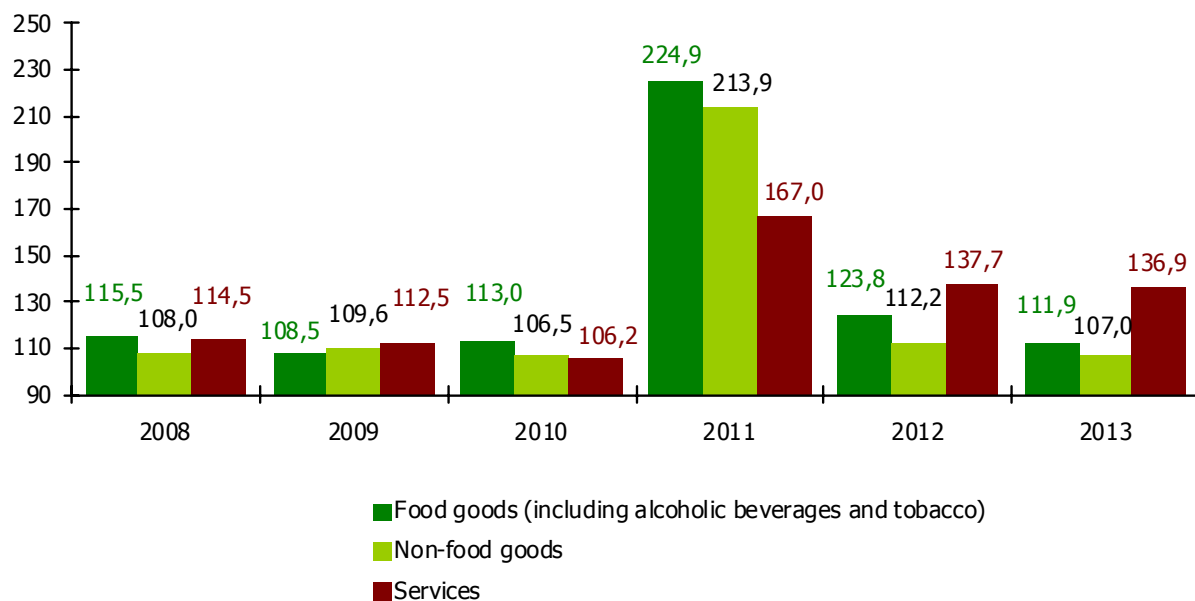

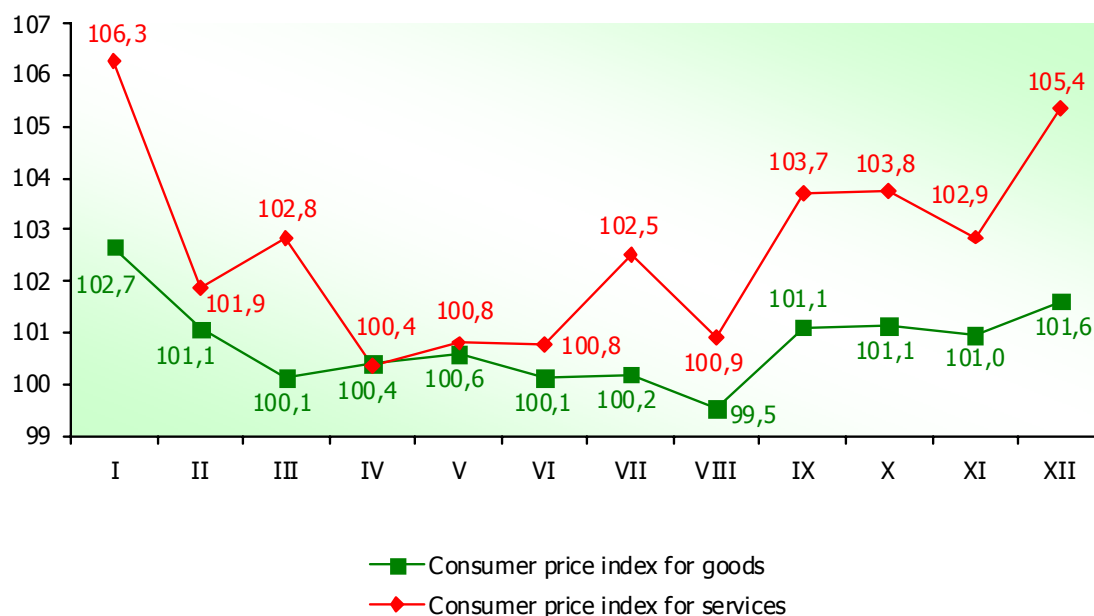

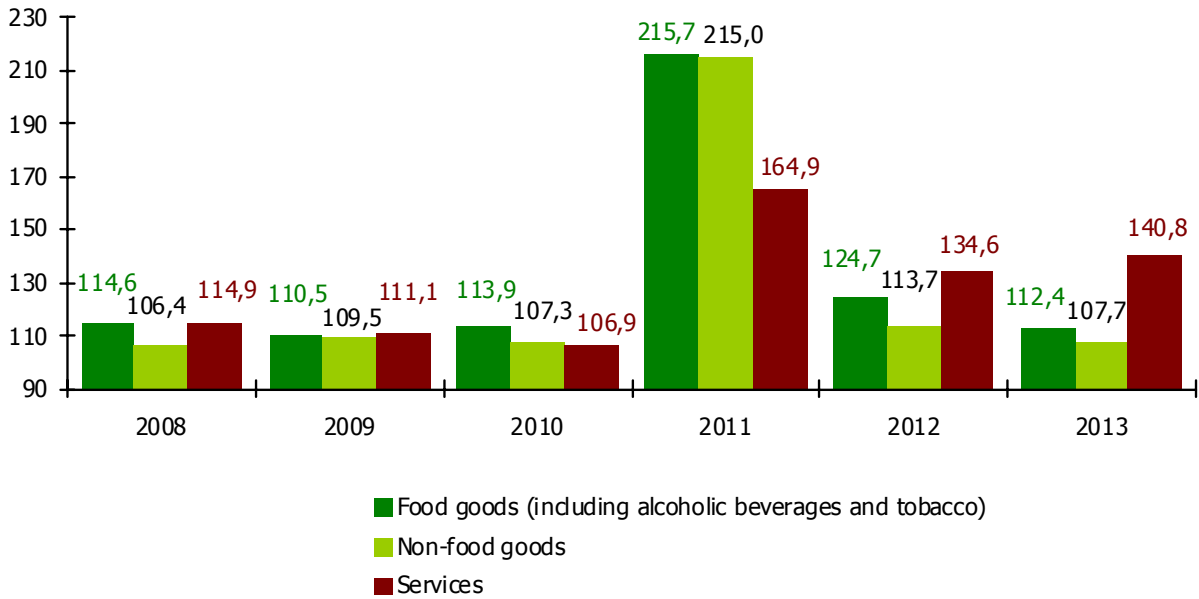

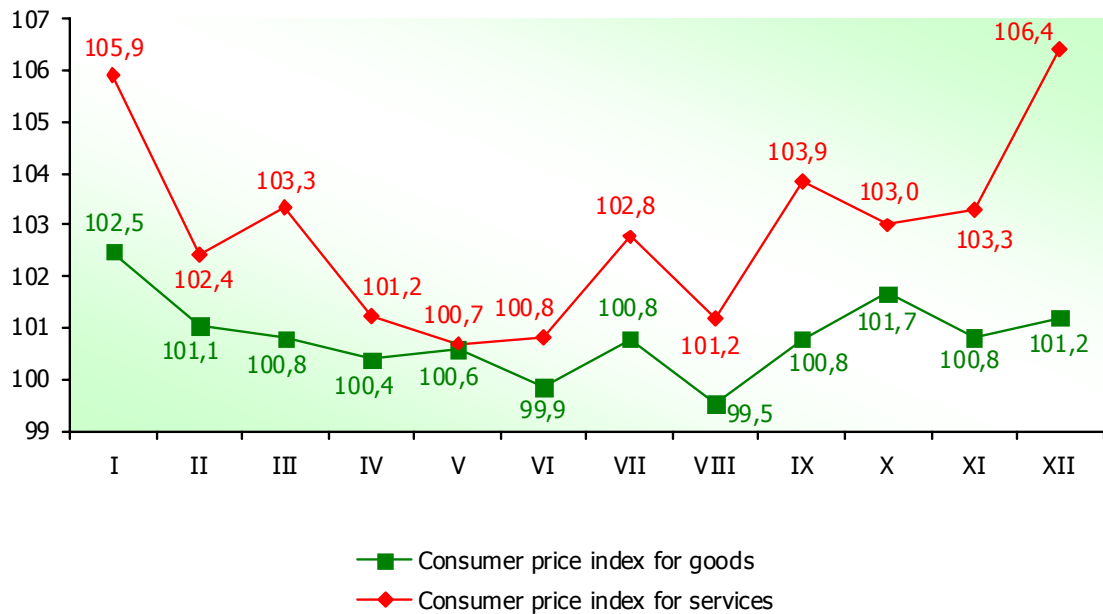

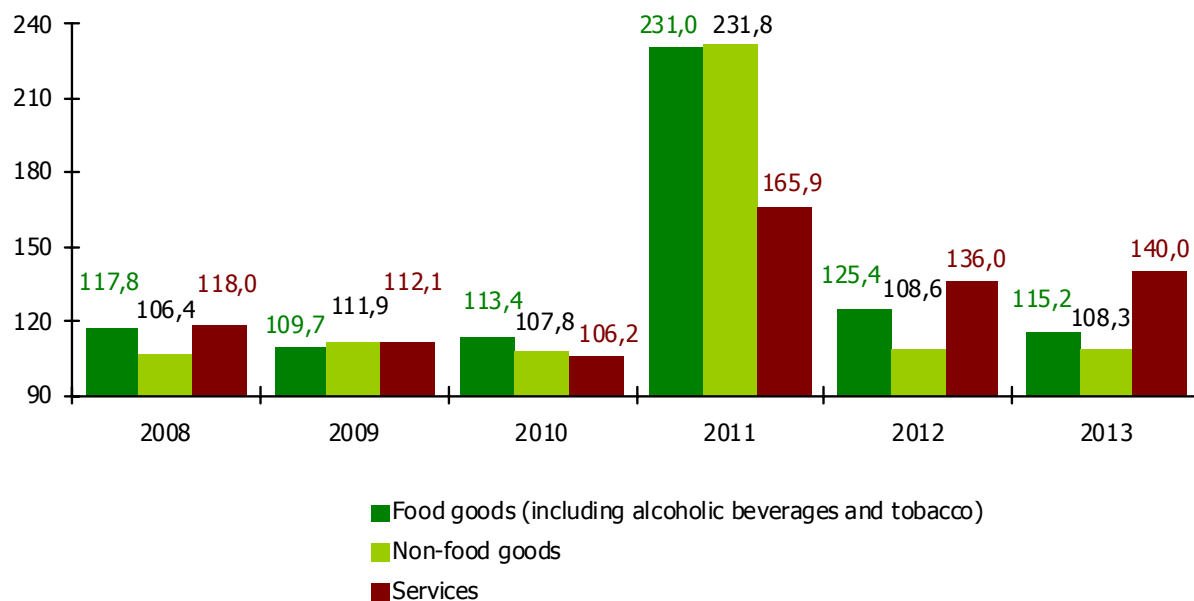

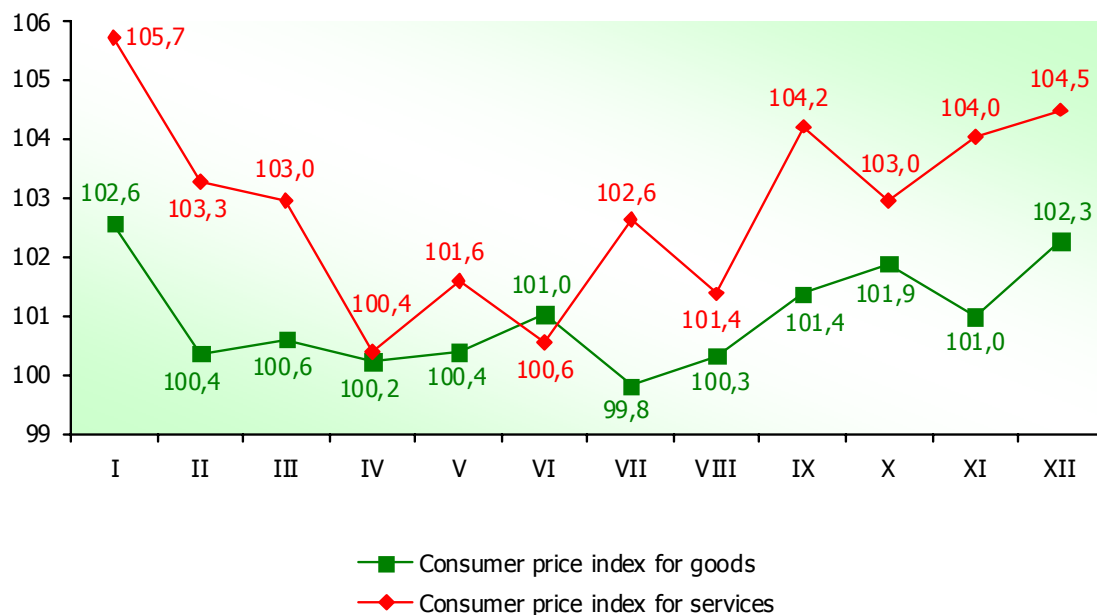

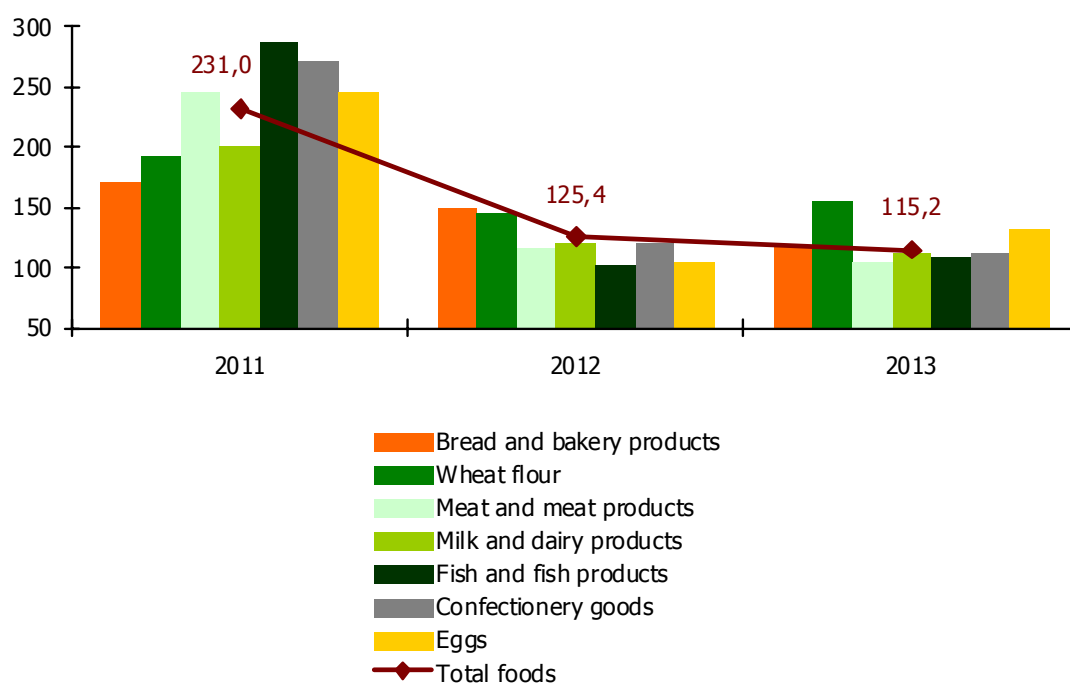

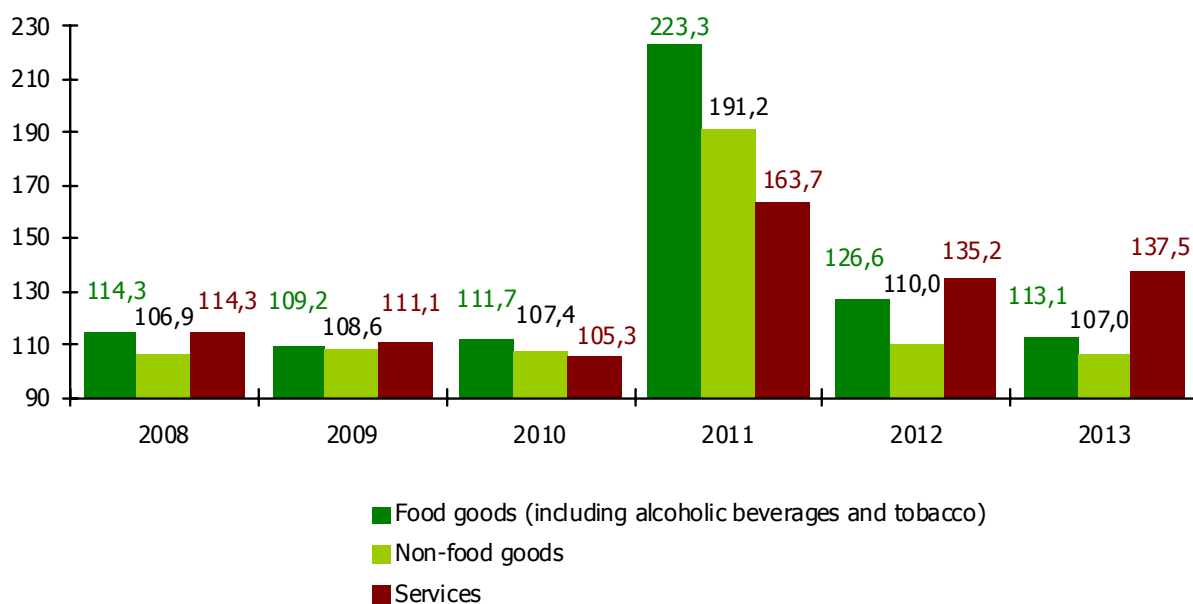
2.47. Consumer price indices for food goods for Minsk City in 2011-2013 (including alcoholic beverages and tobacco)

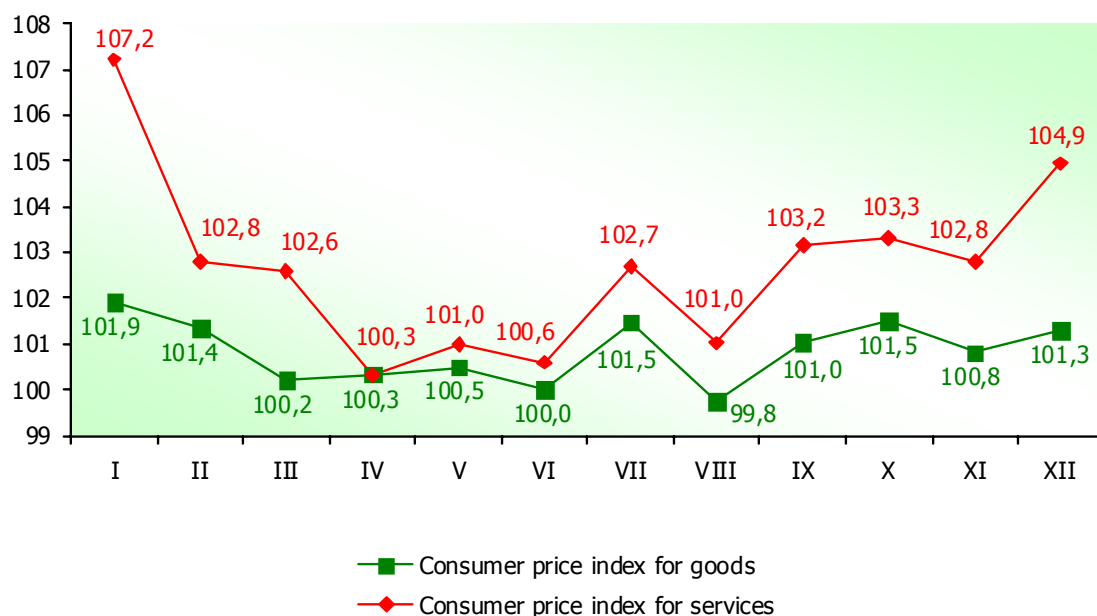

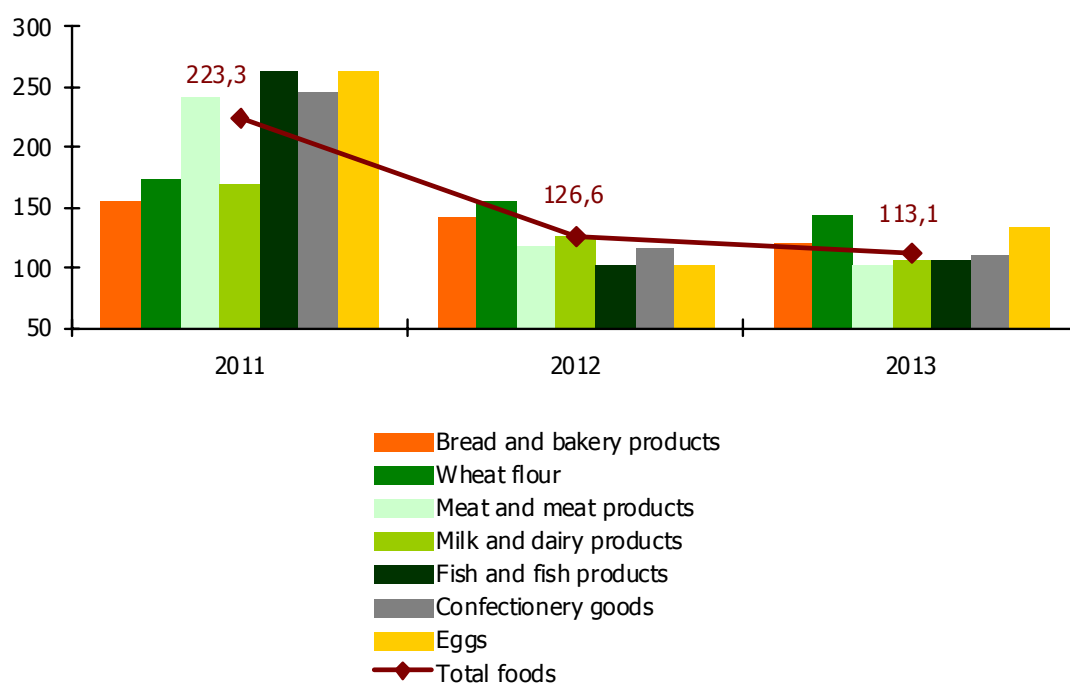

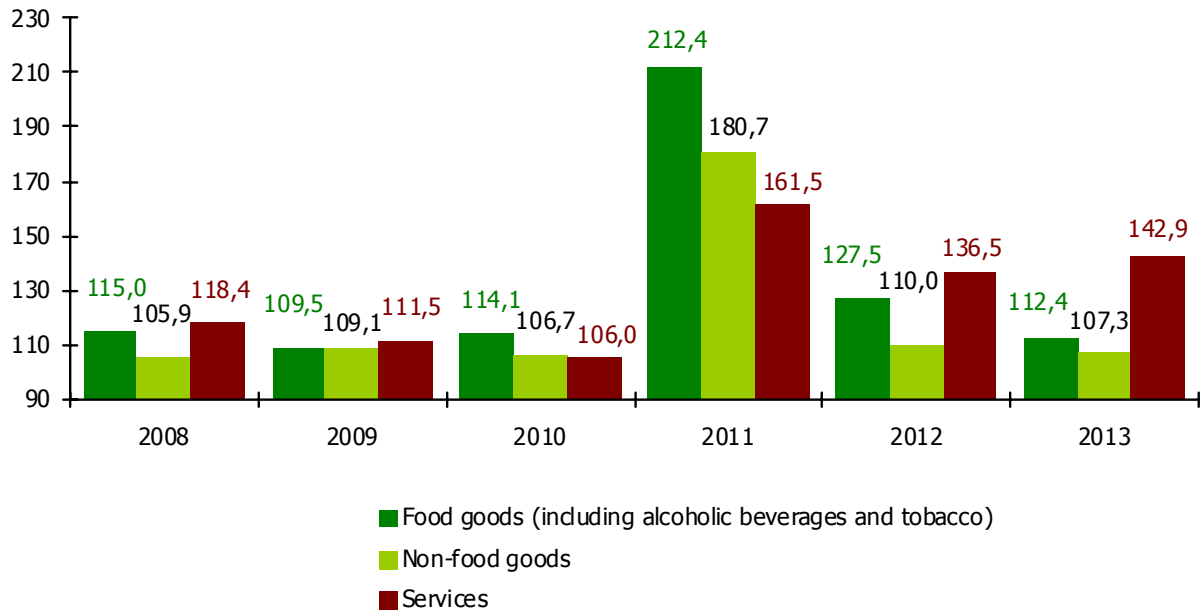
2.52. Consumer price indices for food goods for Minsk region in 2011-2013 (including alcoholic beverages and tobacco)

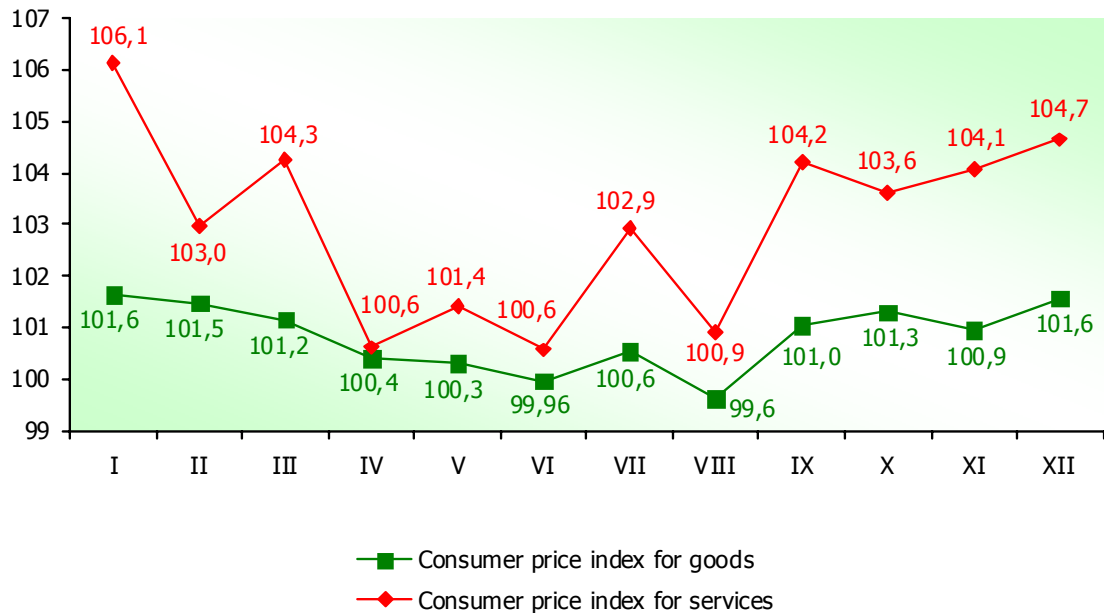

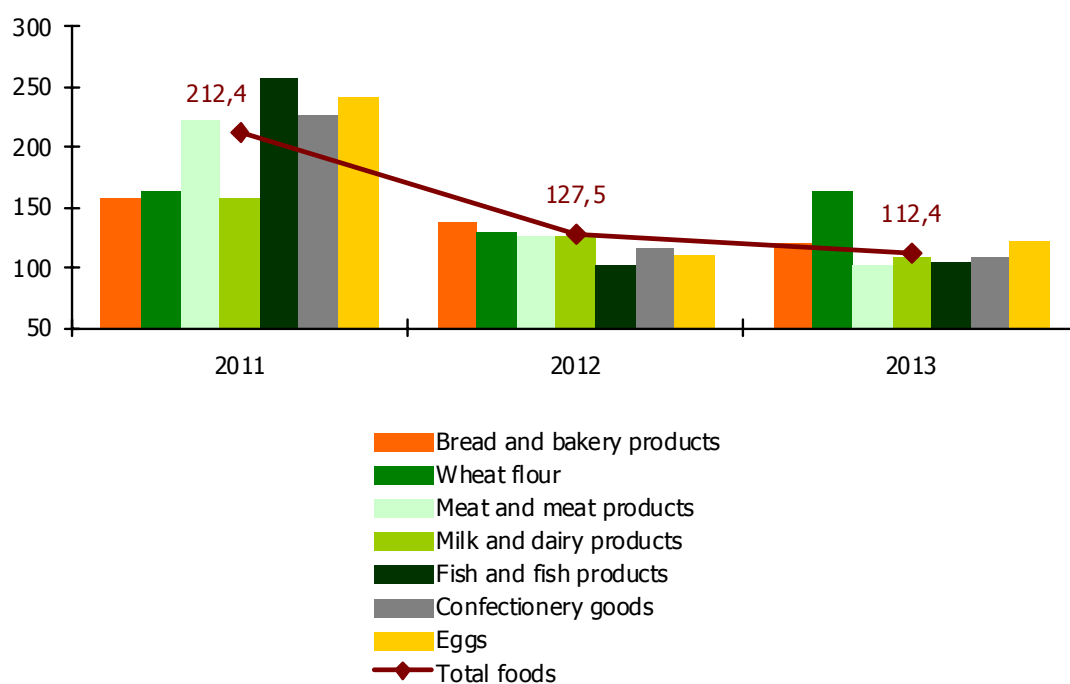

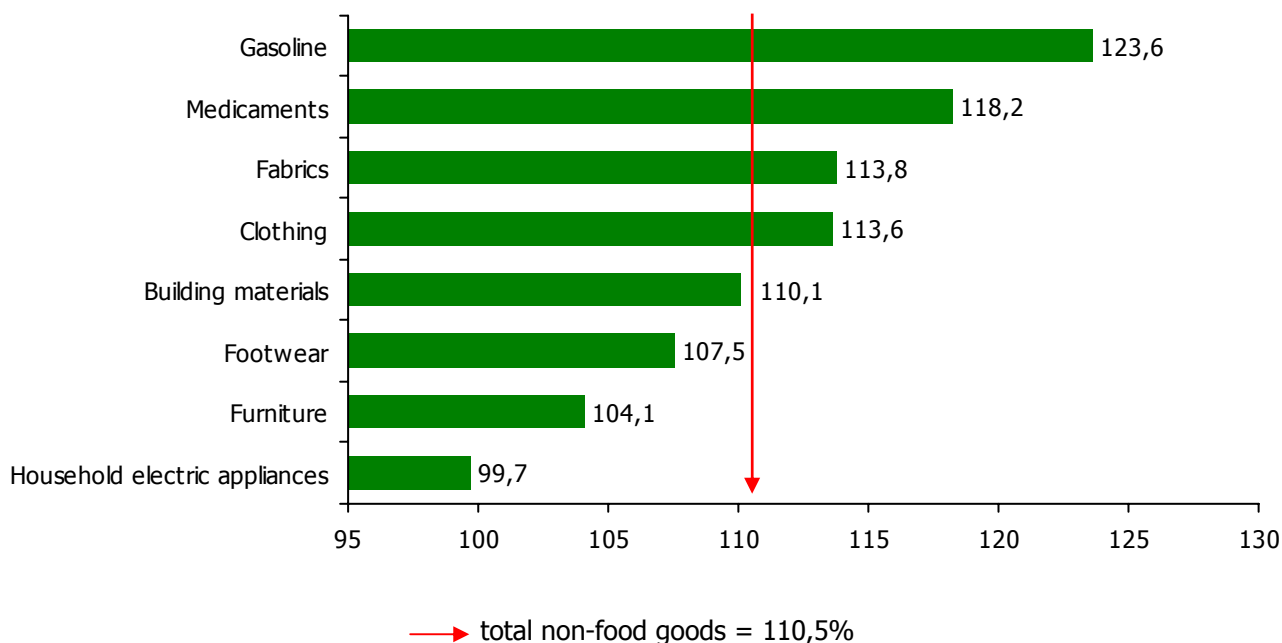

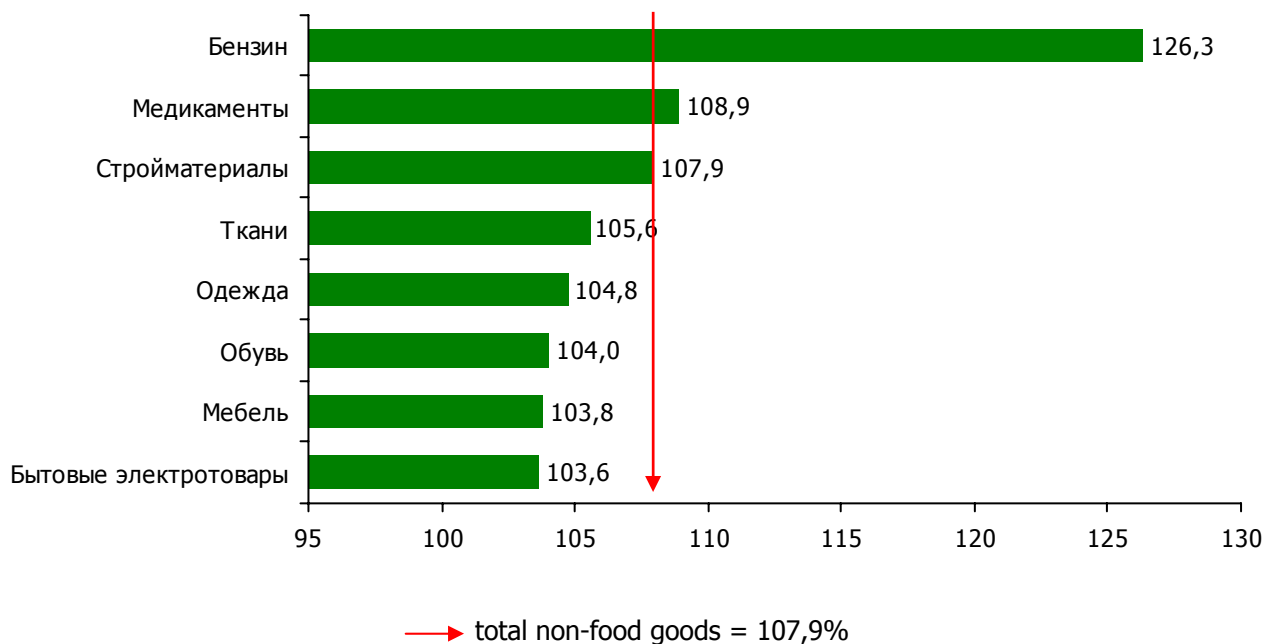

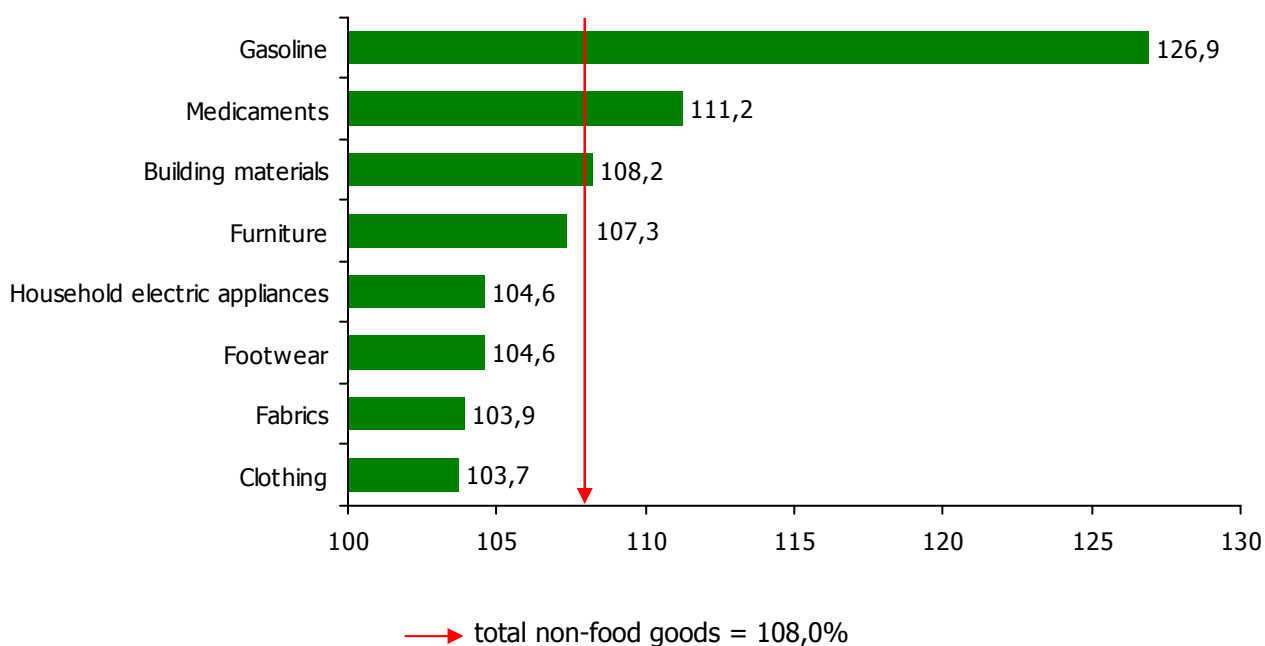

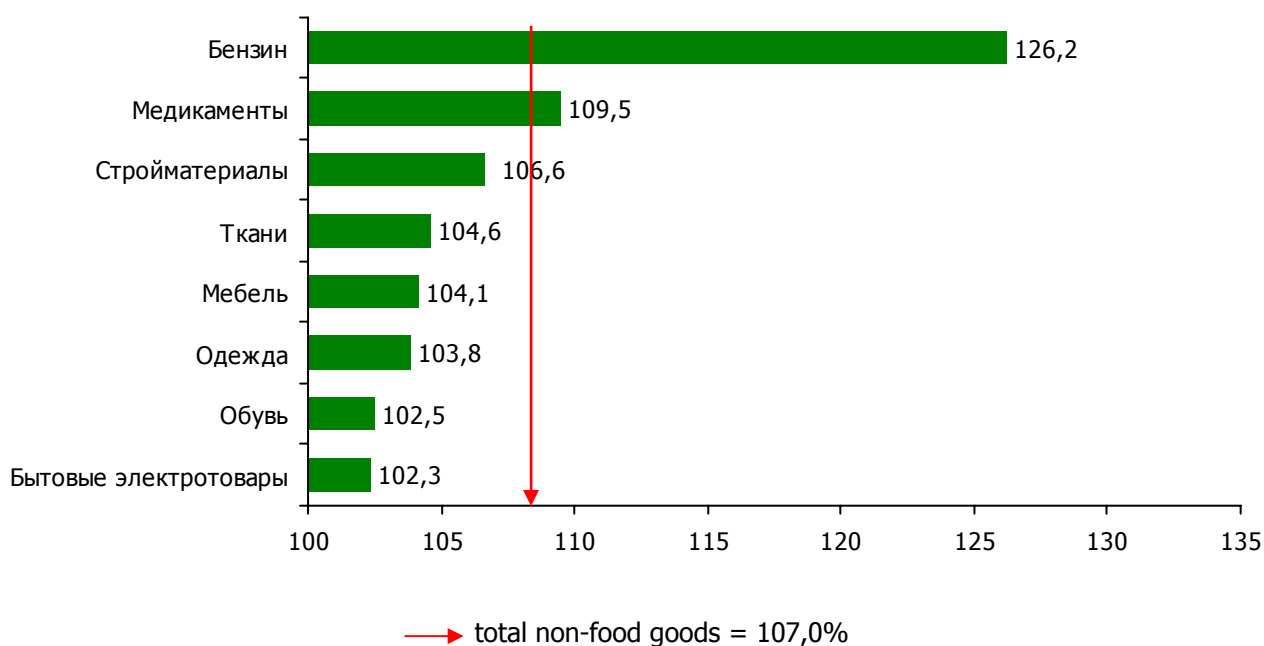

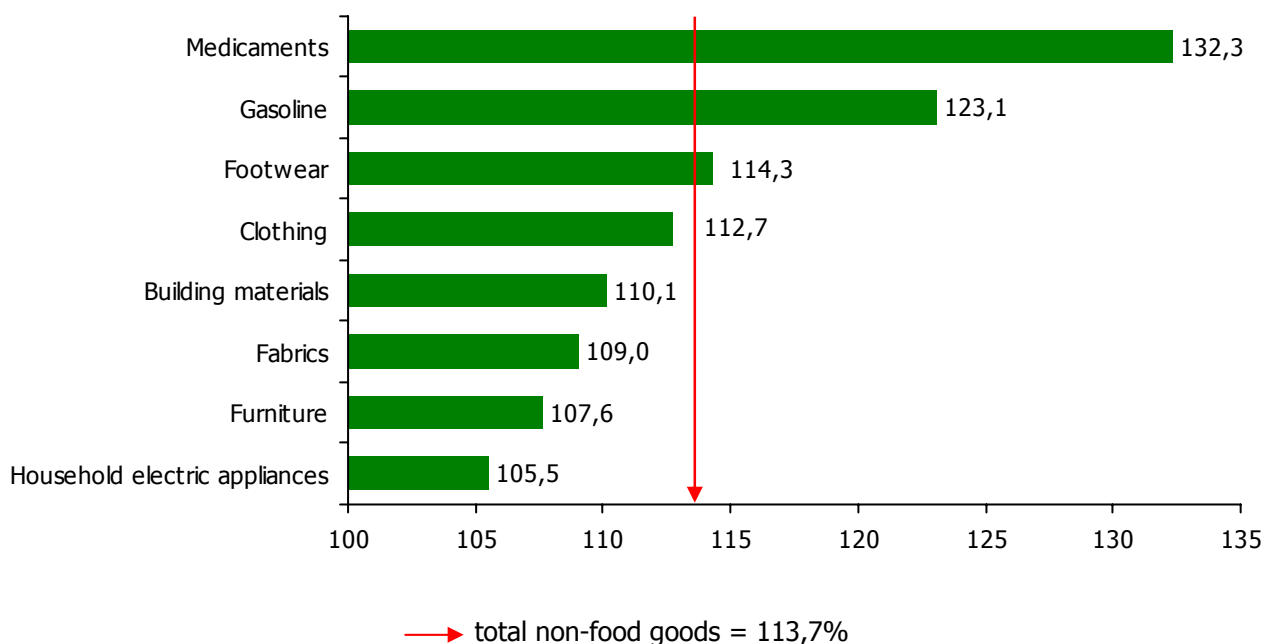

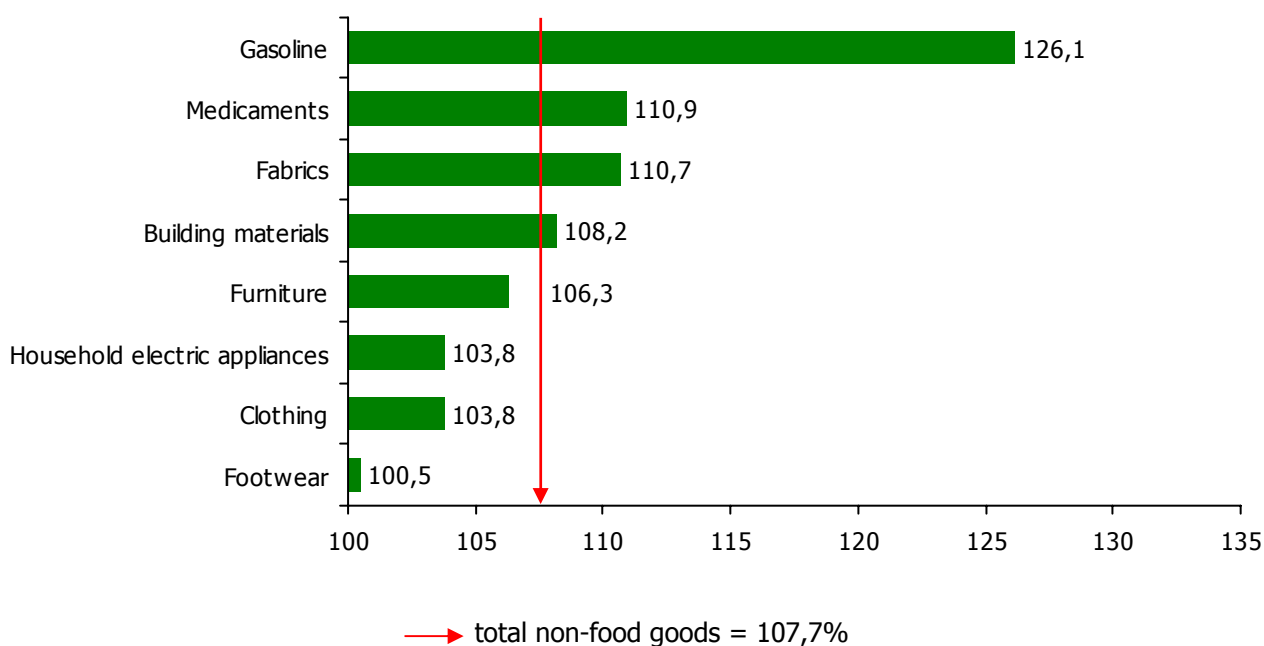

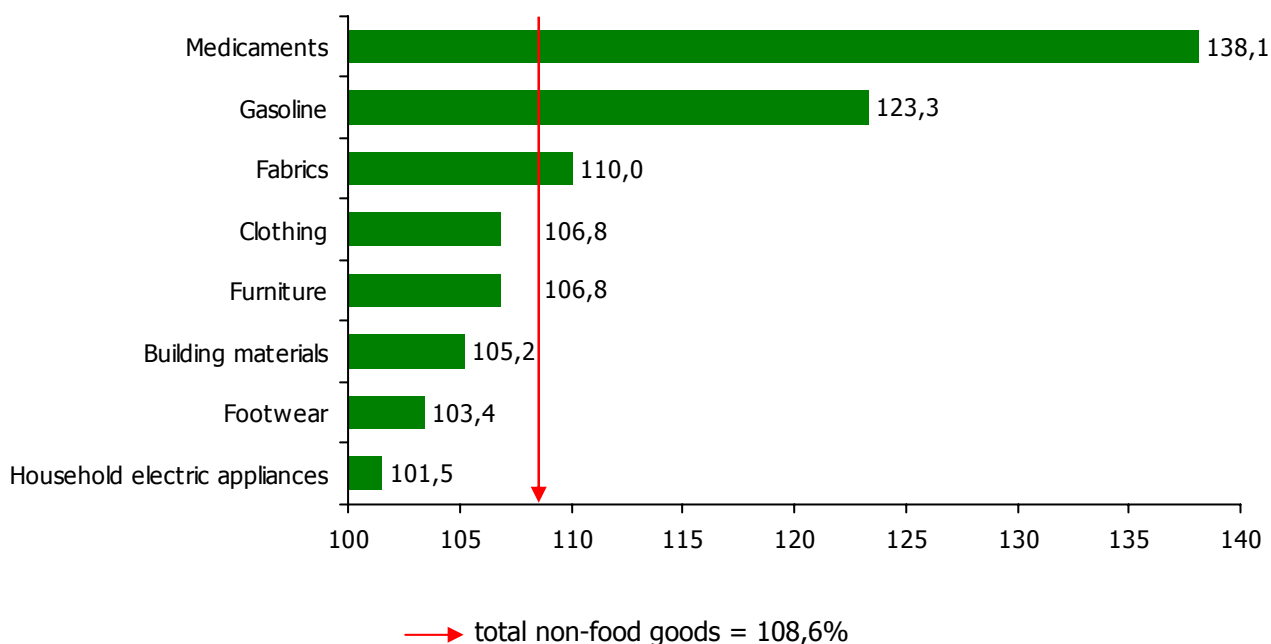

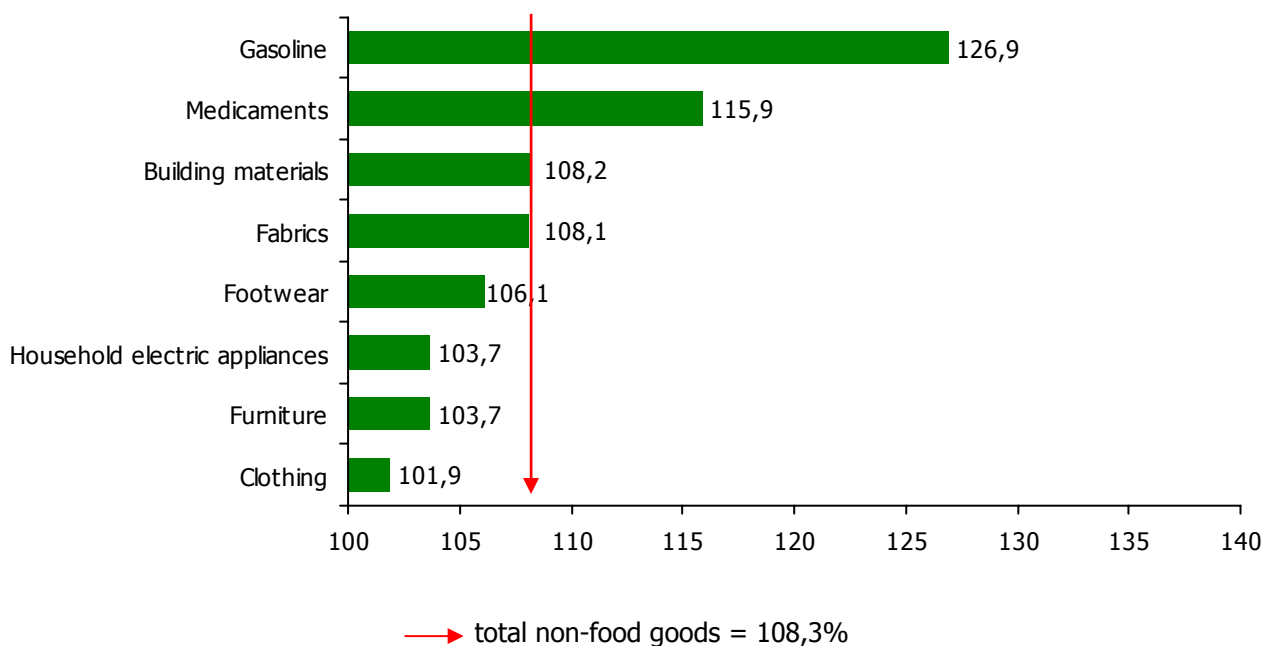

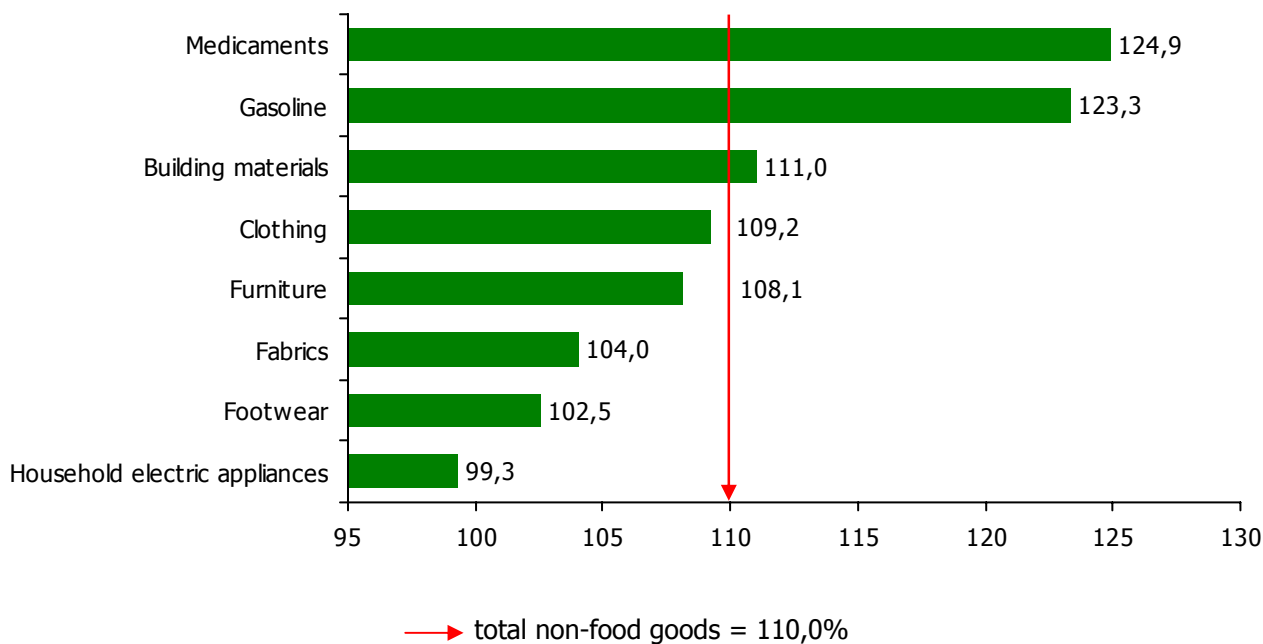

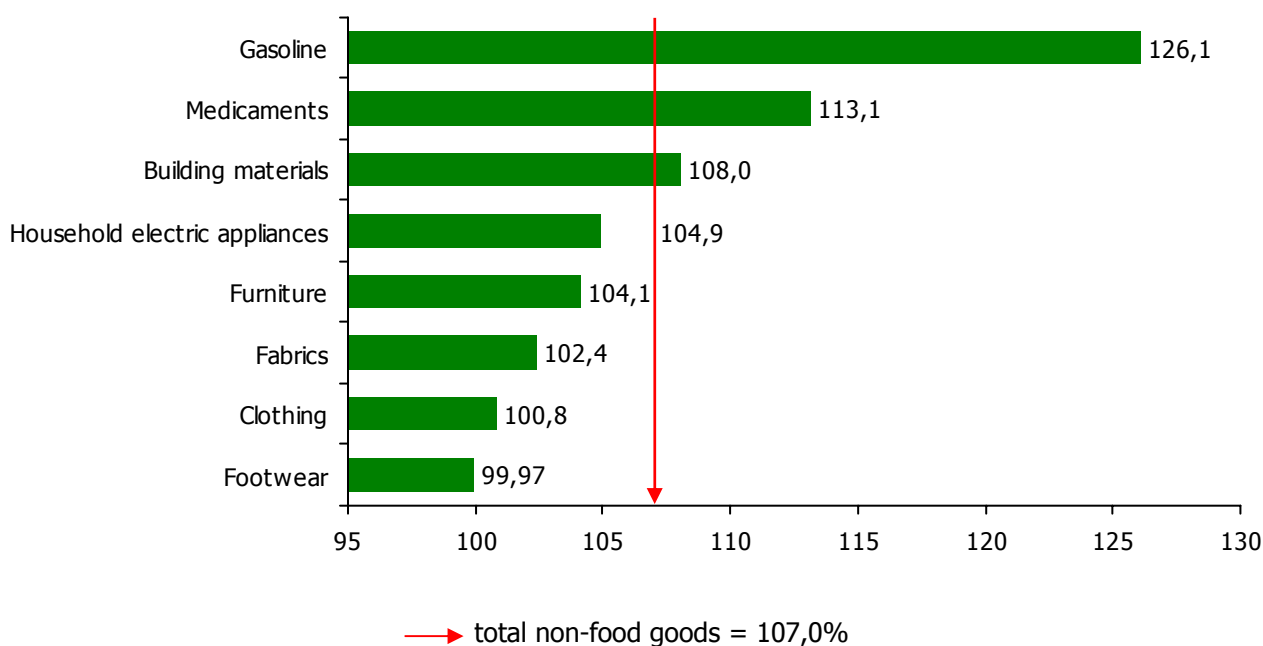

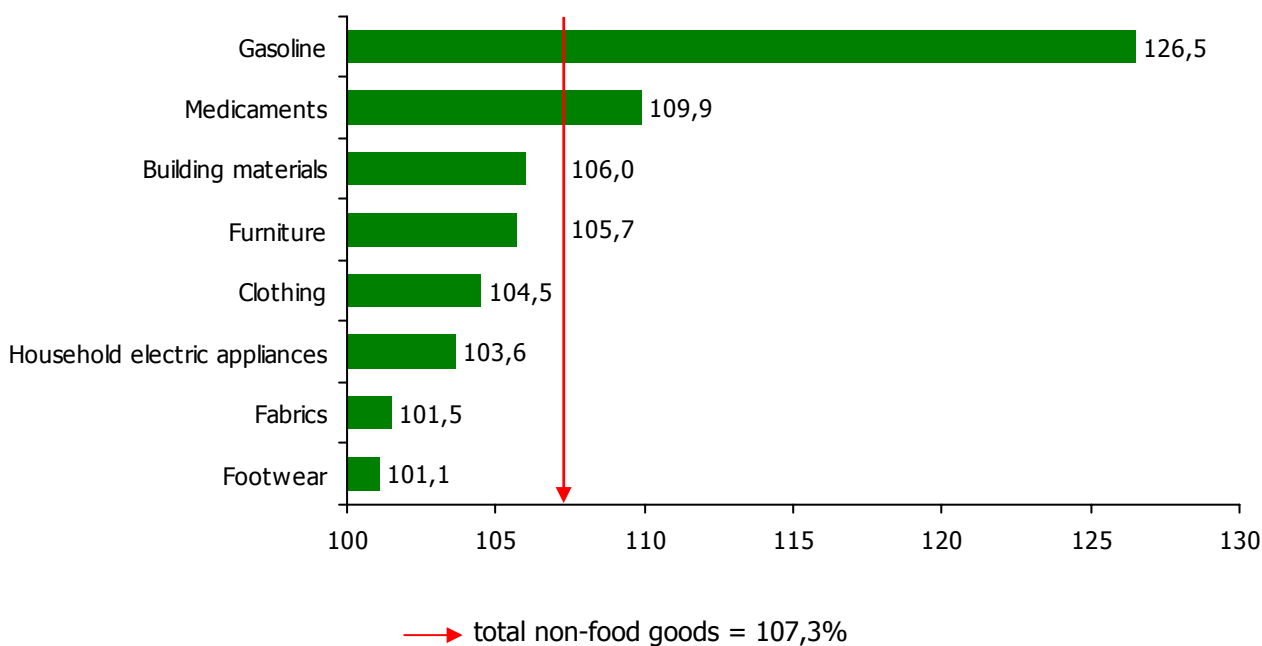

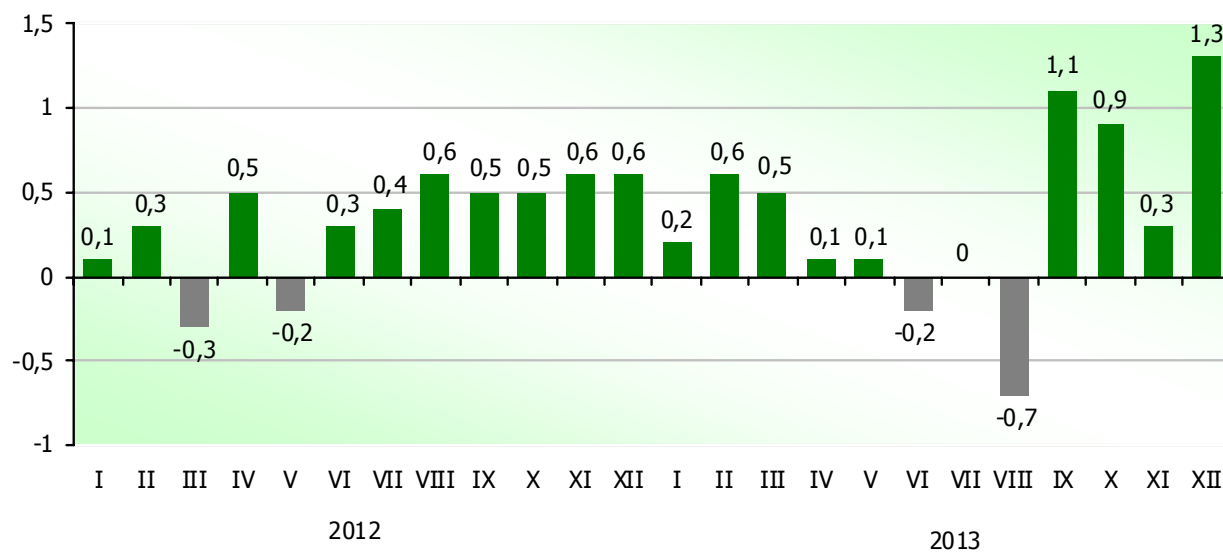

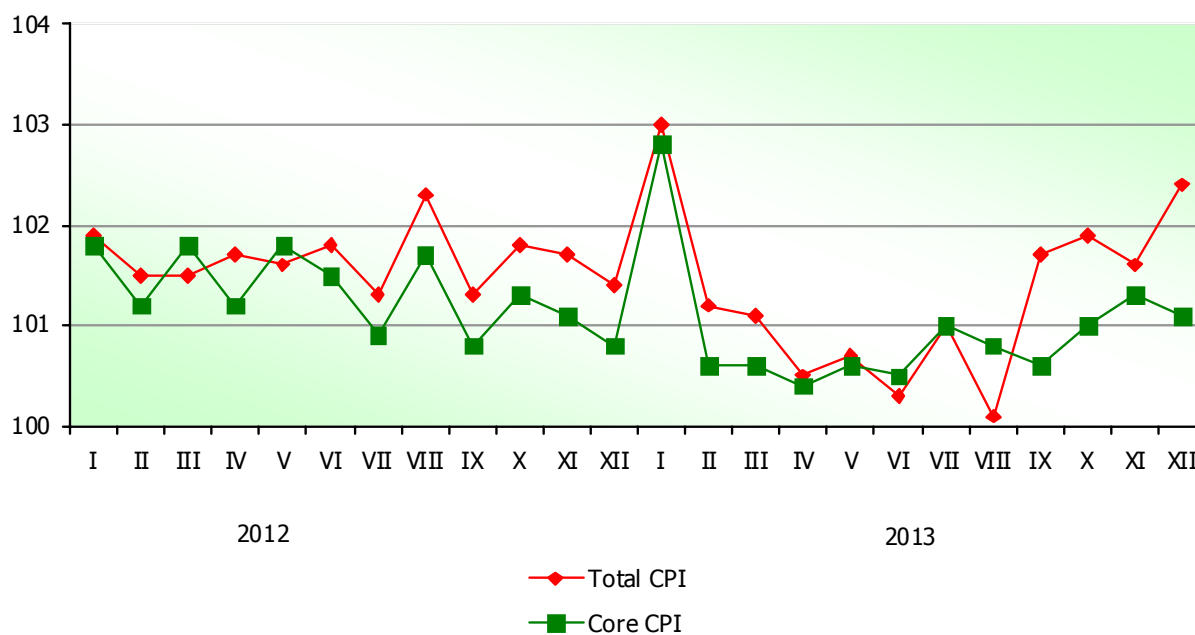
2.112. Change (increase/decrease) in overall inflation as compared with core inflation in the Republic of Belarus

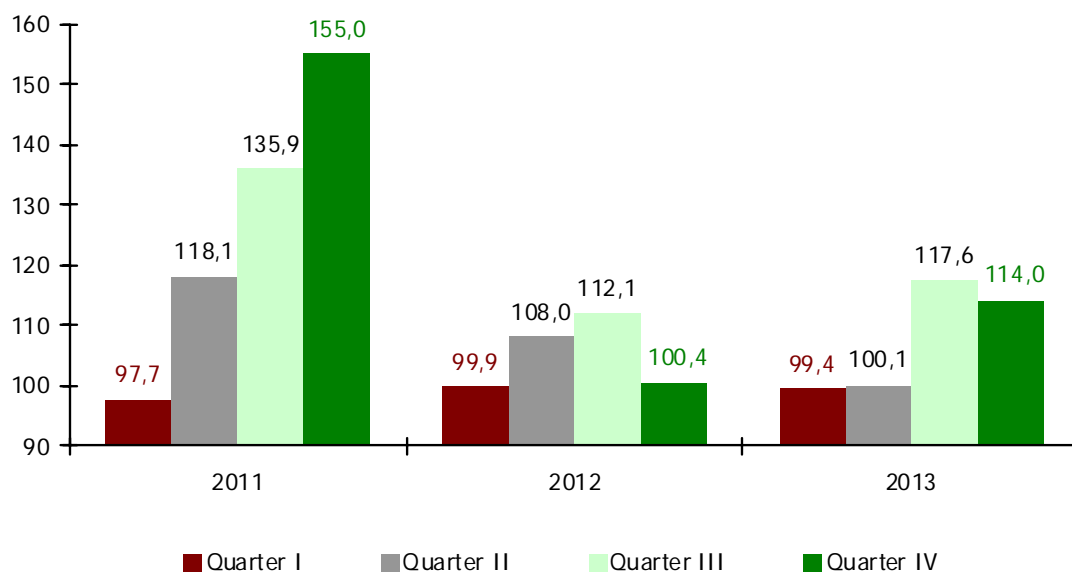

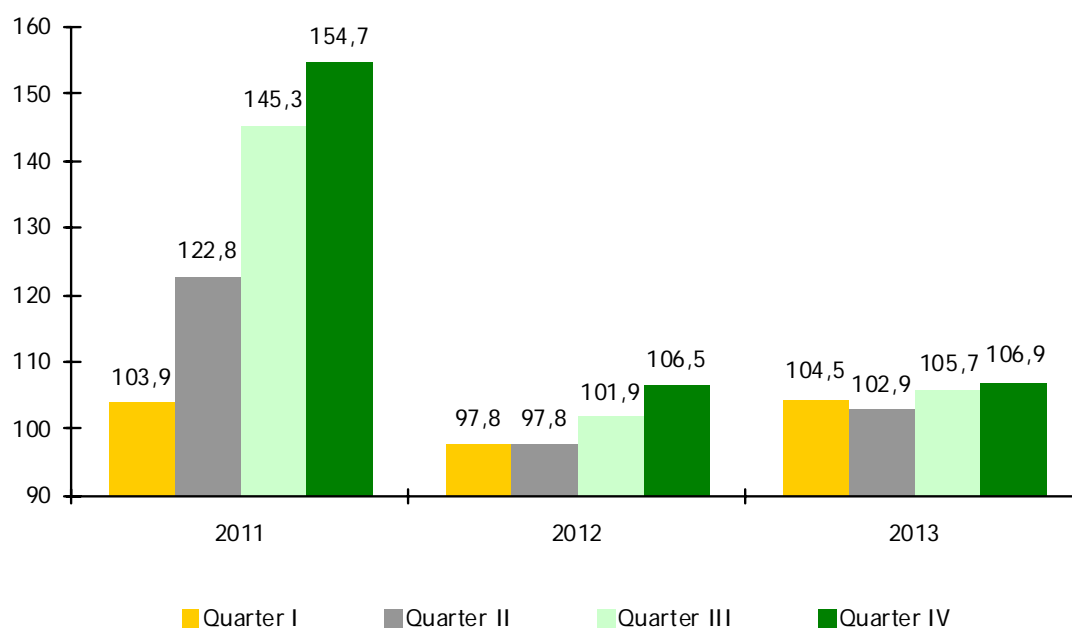
3.4. Price indices in primary housing market

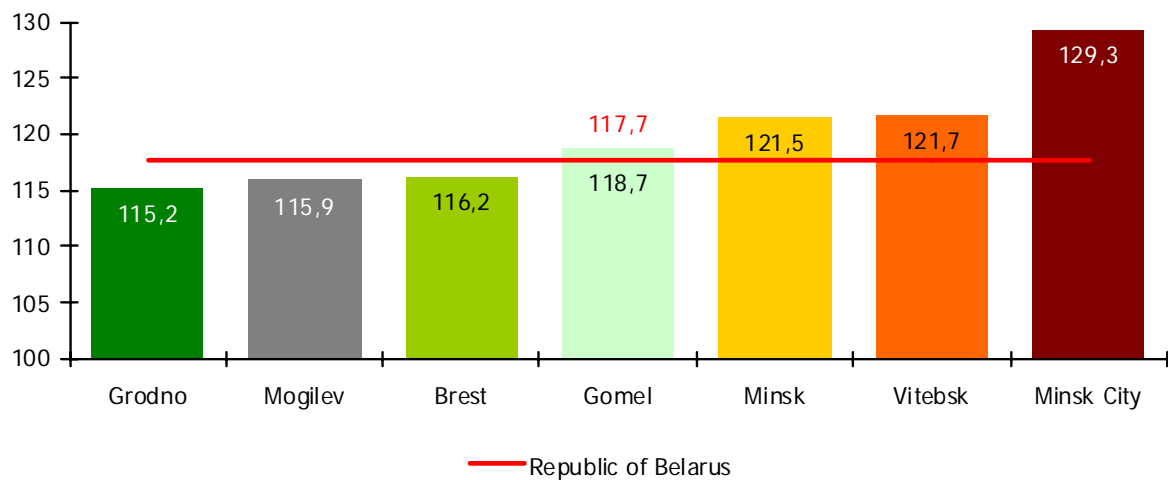

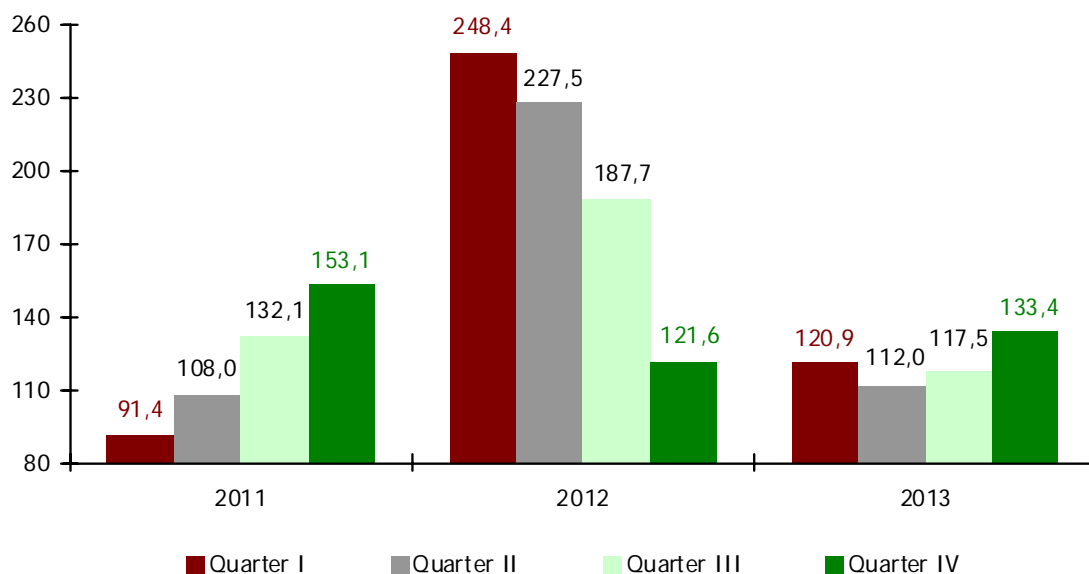

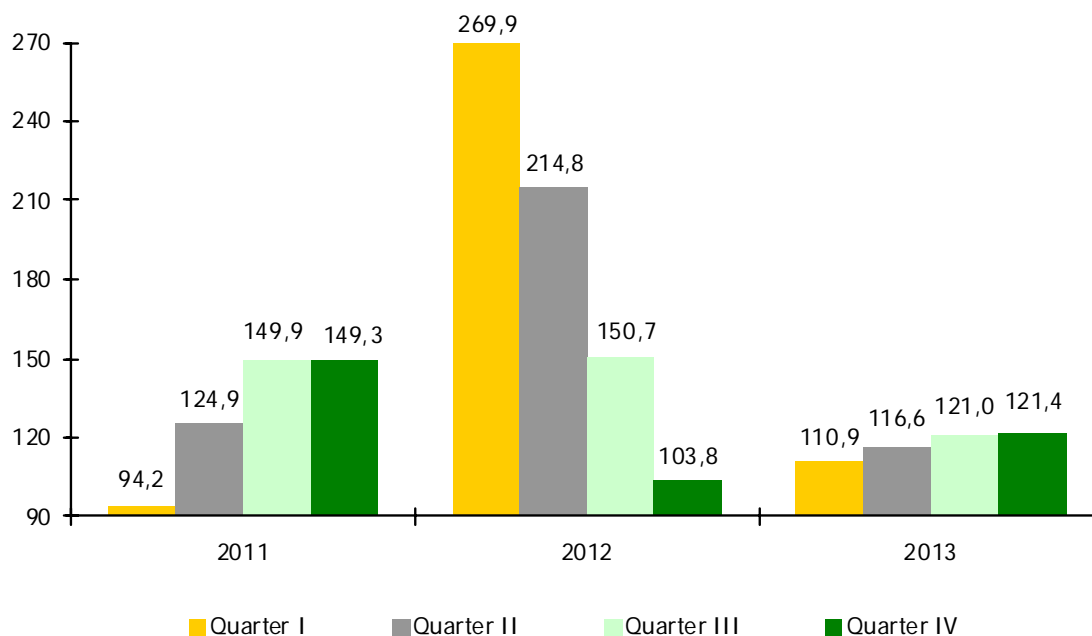
3.9. Price indices in primary housing market

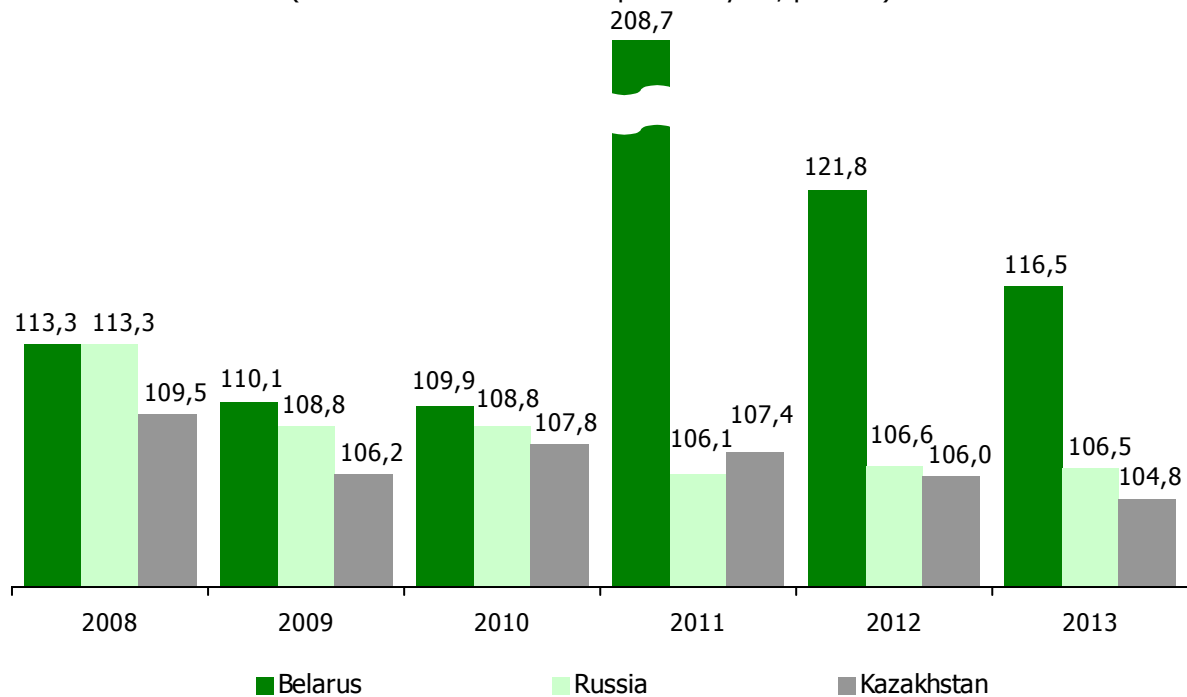
